

Joslin "Josh" McDowell (born 1939) is a Christian author best known for his many works of apologetics, such as Evidence that Demands a Verdict, etc.; he has been affiliated with Campus Crusade for Christ (now "Cru") since 1964. But particularly as he and his wife began raising a family of their own (his son Sean now works with Josh on apologetics; e.g., The Unshakable Truth), he began writing books more along the lines of "Christian Living," such as The Secret of Loving, Givers, Takers and Other Kinds of Lovers, His Image, My Image, etc. Josh's life story was told in Joe Musser's book Josh: Excitement of the Unexpected and also in the DVD Undaunted. This 1994 book (Josh and coauthor Bob Hostetler also wrote The New Tolerance: How a cultural movement threatens to destroy you, your faith, and your children, Don't Check Your Brains at the Door, and The Love Killer: Answering Why True Love Waits) preceded a national speaking campaign at churches. Josh wrote in the first chapter, "if you are like most Christian parents ... your number one fear these days is that you will not be able to pass your values on to the next generation. You fear the influence of the public school system... You wonder if the influence of home and church will be sufficient to counter the forces that threaten your children. As it turns out, there is ample cause for concern." (Pg. 7) They add, "It is painfully apparent that many of our own youth have lost the ability to distinguish right from wrong. Many no longer pursue their

parents' dreams and values but instead absorb the warped values of a sick society... I believe it is a problem that will never be solved until we identify its source and deal with the root causes." (Pg. 9-10)He points out, "movies and television present a totally unrealistic model of actions and consequences... For example, of all the television and movie characters who have engaged in illicit sex, can you name any who have contracted chlamydia or HPV... or one of the other fifty-seven sexually transmitted diseases? Probably very few, because television and movie characters seldom ... suffer the consequences of their immorality." (Pg. 36)He states, "The vast majority of teachers, principals, and church youth workers that I know are crying out for parents to become more involved in the academic and spiritual educations of their own children; that is a tragedy, one that has contributed immensely to the decline of biblical values among our youth." (Pg. 41)He observes, "I have often been asked, 'Is AIDS the curse of God on homosexuality?' I answer, no, I don't believe it is; for one thing, the overwhelming majority of people around the world who have AIDS are not homosexual. But I do believe that God's commandments are like an umbrella... if you choose to move out from under that umbrella during a storm, you're bound to get wet... Therefore, though I can't say that AIDS is a curse from God, I do believe it's among the many consequences of immoral behavior God wishes us to avoid." (Pg. 110)He suggests, "You and I have a golden opportunity to step in and stand up with an answer that can protect our communities and children from the anguish and grief of a society gone mad. We can provide an answer that takes us back to bedrock morals. But we must be careful to choose our issues wisely---particularly in the beginning. A campaign to remove lurid magazines from the local convenience mart may not be the place to start, for example, particularly if an adult book store is selling child pornography just a few miles away. Both are promoting immorality, of course, but the latter is obviously the wiser place to start." (Pg. 244)Christians raising children, or just concerning about moral values among youth, will certainly be interested in this book.

This book is based on a Churched Youth Survey performed in 1994 involving 3,795 youth from thirteen denominations. The eight-page survey questionnaire included 193 questions spread across four categories: Love and Sex; Marriage and Family; Faith and Religion; and Attitudes and Lifestyles. While there is no statistical weighting of the data, the results are weighted according to the responsiveness of the denomination's churches, which the authors' believe reflects a good cross-section of evangelical churches.A discussion of truth proceeds from the halls of history beginning in "the Garden of Eden, when the serpent induced our first parents to trust their own reason instead of simply obeying God's command" up to this present day. In the Renaissance, man

(not God) became central, the Enlightenment found man's reason to be transcendent, the Industrial Revolution caused man to think of himself as self-sufficient, and Darwin's theory of evolution provided an alternative to a theistic understanding of origins. "God was no longer 'needed' to explain or understand how the world and man came to be." The result is that man believes himself "free to reach his own conclusions about right and wrong independent of God and His decrees." Truth as God defines it in Scripture is radically different from what many define truth to be today. "Absolute truth— that is, that which is true for all people, for all times, for all places" is no longer consistently believed, defended, and applied in the lives of people. This book examines why this crisis exists in each of these three areas in detail. Be aware that realistic, hard-hitting anecdotes provide illustrative examples of the topics discussed. While many are fictional and some are drawn from factual personal experience, the authors' selections of these accounts are true-to-life and some readers may find them disturbing. This volume also offers chapters which deal with truth as it specifically relates to sex, honesty, family, love, justice, mercy, respect, and self-control. Truth is defined for each topic, a test for truth is given, and evidence for that truth. A full chapter is dedicated to recovering truth in the home, church, and community. In addition, data from the survey upon which this text was written are included in tables with summary statements and comprise the latter third of the book. Following is a section of additional resources for adults as well as youth. Included are listings of ministries that can also be enlisted to help. While providing specific information and instruction to parents and Christian leaders, this book is also valuable to all those who want to understand why and how biblical truth has become irrelevant to people today. For this reason, steps are given which can be taken to restore belief in absolute truth in the lives of all people of all ages in this generation. Reviewed by D. Garland.
